
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BACKGROUND

- •In URBACT II project "TOGETHER for territories of co-responsibility" 8 EU minicipalities were testing out the co-responsibility approach, which seeks to put citizens, civic associations and municipalities in a new productive relationship

INTEGRATED GOVERNANCE MODEL FOR MUNICIPALITIES 12 Steps for Evaluating and Increasing Well-being in Municipalities




1st stage: preparation 2nd stage: research





EXAMPLE OF WELL-BEING INDICATOR

A05 Indicator of Education (249)

Very bad situation: Lack of access to educational institutions (kindergartens, schools).

Bad situation: No possibilities to improve yourself. Interest groups are not available. Children are not able to sport, travel, participate in interest education.

Medium situation: The educational institutions are available. There are good schools in sufficient numbers.


Good situation: It is possible to educate children. The development groups are available for children (for 0-3 years). There is a chance for children to spare their free time.

Ideal situation: Competitive level of education in comparison with other EU countries. Lifelong learning programs are using.

Situation in Salaspils: MEDIUM



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LESSONS LEARNED

The focus group findings give new and valuable insights into the concerns of citizens

They bring home to policy-makers and politicians the multidimentional elements of public interest and the full range of issues which municipality needs to address

When there are linked to a co-responsibility process where citizens and civic associations are engaged in addressing these concerns, then new perspectives for action are opened up

The pilot actions being undertaken by municipality are testing a number of these

MAIN CONCLUSIONS

Main challenges:

- validity of results
- political and administrative risks
- monitoring of results
- resources

Great advantages of this approach:

- •it reaches the parts of the community that other methods do not reach
- •preparing new development level of local government

The provided methodology could be nominated as reliable research methodology for evaluating well-being in society with condition of all mentioned challenges would be considered and activities to reduce risks would be undertaken
