The chair of NORBA **Heikki Eskelinen** opened the conference with more than 60 participants during two days.



Peter Billing (right) from the ESPON Coordination Unit gave a general background to the work in the ESPON programme.



Jean Peyrony from DG Regio at the European Commission introduced the work with the 5th Cohesion report that is focused on economic, social and territorial cohesion and how the EU, national and regional governments have contributed.

Nils Boje Groth (KVL, Denmark) started day 2 with giving an overview on the different approaches in national spatial planning from a European point of view.



Carl Johan Engström from KTH talked about the need for interplay between international and national planning perspectives.



Timo Turunen from the Finnish Ministry of the Environment developed under the title "Finish planning meets Europe" how spatial planning in Finland has developed since the middle of 1990s.



Inguna Urtane (Ministry of Environmental Protection and Regional Development, Latvia) started the "Baltic session" by talking about how Latvia has developed different regional planning concept for the next program period.



Tavo Kikas (Estonian Ministry of Internal Affairs, Estonia) started by presenting the planning system in Estonia that cosists of four levels – national, regional, general plans at municipality level but also detailed plans at municipality level.



Marija Burinskiene, who is Lithuanian ECP and professor at Vilnius Gediminas Technical University, talked about how regional planning in Lithuania has developed by checking different types of planning at different levels.
